## Congressional race gets little interest

DALLAS (UPI) - It may be viewed as pivotal in Austin or Washington, but the eight-candidate scramble for the 1st Congressional District seat apparently isn't drawing much interest in Texarkana, Marshall, Athens or Paris.

Candidates and party workers expect only 65,000 of the district's 300,000 registered voters to cast ballots Saturday in what Texas Republicans hope will be their best chance to capture a House seat in traditional Democratic territory.

Eight candidates have filed to fill the seat vacated by Rep. Sam Hall, D-Marshall, who resigned May 27 to become a federal judge. Observers expect an August runoff between Edd Hargett, the only Republican in the race, and Democrats Sam Russell or Jim Chapman.

Russell and Chapman have tradition on their side — the 1st District traditionally has been a haven for "yellow-dog" Democrats. Hargett has money — an estimated \$1 million campaign chest — and the virtually full-time campaign support of Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas.

The eight-candidate field includes a former Southwest Conference quarterback, a self-styled "poor boy," a former state official who resigned after pleading guilty to misusing state funds, several local attorneys and state legislators and the first candidate of the new Christian Contender Party.

— Edd Hargett, 37, an electrician from Linden and the only Republican in the race, is a former A&M quarterback who led the Aggies to their last outright Southwest Conference title in 1967. His campaign has stressed the "East Texas tradition of independent conservative representation" and the fact that he is not an attorney.

"I am an engineer and a farmer," he said. "And it is a sad day when there are more lawyers on the House Agriculture Committee than there are farmers."

— Carl Brown, 61, of Nash, a semi-retired businessman who says he is running a "poor-boy campaign," plans to back up his claim that the congressional seat shouldn't be bought by hauling his donkey, Frank, to auction barns across the district.

"I won't let Frank be bought, just like I won't let the congressional seat of East Texas be bought and sold," he said.

— Jim Chapman, 40, an attorney from Sulphur Springs, has campaigned strongly on promises to preserve Social Security. He has attacked President Reagan and Gramm — and, by extension, Hargett — for what he says are attempts to cut benefits to the elderly.

"I think it borders on being criminal to go to our old and our sick people and say we should balance the budget on their backs," said Chapman, who ran unsuccessfully in the 1984 Democratic primary against state Sen. Ed Howard of Texarkana.

— Billy Flanagan, 33, an attorney from Mount Pleasant, is campaigning against bureaucracy and for farmers and ranchers. He says budget and trade deficits must be reversed to provide a healthier climate for agriculture.

"These are the people we depend on for our sustenance, and they are vital to our national interests," Flanagan said.

— Warren G. Harding, 64, of Brownboro, is making a political comeback after resigning as state treasurer in 1982, when he was allowed to plead guilty to a misdemeanor after being indicted on felony charges of official misconduct. Harding also has emphasized the importance of shoring up Social Security and reducing federal spending.

"We need a constitutional amendment that we can't deficit spend, and we need to reduce the national debt before it consumes us," Harding said. "I want to join hands with (Florida Democratic congressman) Claude Pepper and do some fighting for Social Security."

— Jim McWilliams, 47, a businessman from Hallsville and a member of the Texas House, also is hitting hard on the Social Security issue, estimating that 40 percent of the people who will vote in the June 29 election will be age 55 or older.

McWilliams said Congress must balance the federal budget, "but do so in areas which do not shortchange those who have put so much into Social Security."

— Sam Russell, 39, a two-term state representative and attorney from Mount Pleasant, stresses his conservative record in the Legislature. He tells voters he voted against a 1984 tax increase for schools and highways and voted for lowering interest rates on credit cards.

"My record in Austin reflects the conservative viewpoint of this district," said Russell, who opposes limits on cost-of-living adjustments for Social Security and favors opening trade barriers to boost sale of American products overseas.

— Fred John Wieder, 35, who owns homes in Tyler County and Alvin, neither of which is in the 1st District, is campaigning as the first candidate of the new Christian Contender Party. If elected, he said he intends to open a business in the district and work in Washington on "getting back to the Bible principles."

"Instead of saying get prayer back in school, I say get God back in school, maybe even have classes to teach the Bible," Wieder said.

## One killed, two injured in collision of airplanes

TEMPLE, Texas (UPI) — Two pilots, who apparently did not see each other as they tried to land their single-engine airplanes, collided above a runway and crashed Sunday, killing one man and critically injuring two.

Killed in the crash was Steven Morris, 34, the pilot of one of the planes.

A passenger in his plane, Gregory Arzola, 30, and the pilot of the other craft, Shannon Schuchit, 23, were in critical condition at Scott and White Memorial Hospital. All three victims were stationed at Fort Hood, police said.

The freak accident happened about 4:15 p.m. CDT at Draughton-Miller Municipal Airport as the planes, a Cessna 150 with two people aboard and Cessna 152 with just the pilot aboard, approached for landing, Deputy Police Chief Steve Klempa said.

"It appeared that both aircraft were attempting to come in for a landing, however, their wing tips collided approximately 150-200 feet north of runway No. 15," Klempa said.

The pilot of a third plane saw that the two Cessnas were about to collide and radioed the tower to warn them away, but there was no response, Klempa said.

"They were both single-engine so the whole front was all pretty much caved all the way back to the cab part. In fact people were pinned in pretty good. It took a while for people to remove them from the aircraft," Klempa said.

Authorities did not know how high the planes were when they collided, but Klempa said "since they were 150-200 feet just north of the end of the runway, they weren't too awful high off the ground."

Wreckage from the planes were just 10 yards apart. Klempa said both planes were demolished. Morris was piloting the Cessna 150, Klempa said.
